
"We are very proud of her. My husband is from Mexico and he can't believe that she loves all of the traditional music," Maria added.



Way Beyond Tires...

hen most of us hear the word 'Firestone,' we naturally think tires. But when it comes to the 110 Teamster mechanics working at 23 area Firestone locations throughout Southern California, let it be known their skill and talents reach far beyond tires.

"Sure we do tires, but we also do alignments, suspensions, brakes, water pumps, timing belts," Corona Lead Technician Miguel Velazquez explains. "We also do diagnostics, general maintenance, radiators, hoses, belts, flushes ... pretty much you name it and we can fix it. The only thing we don't do is major repair work on engines, differentials and transmissions." For over 40 years, Local 495 has been representing technicians, mechanics and student apprentices at companyowned Firestone locations in Ventura, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside and San Bernardino counties.

"This is a large group of very hardworking, dedicated employees who get up every day and do a fantastic job. My hat's off to them," Local 495 Business Agent Gene Rivera raved.

The group is currently working under a three-year agreement that is set to expire at the end of September. Rivera says negotiations will begin later this summer and will include five rankand-file members, as well as Local 495 Business Agent Roman Delgado, who also represents the vast group.

"There are a few things that we'd like to see in the new contract," noted Valazquez, a member of the bargaining committee. "A higher pay rate for technicians, better health and pension benefits, and improved language for paid holidays are some of things at the top of our list."

The Firestone locations – all sevenday-a-week operations – are staffed by only five or six Teamsters at each facility. Together, they work to cover long shifts that include 12-hour days during the week. Currently, the facilities are closed only five days a year: Christmas, New Year's Day, Thanksgiving, Easter and the Fourth of July.

The union does enjoy positive labor relations with the company. "It's a good company to work for. They offer a lot of opportunity for their employees to learn and grow within the organization," Rivera noted. "Many of our members at Firestone have been with the company for 10 years or longer. I'm looking forward to negotiating a fair and equitable agreement for this hardworking group."
