


















Tire Centers, LLC

70 Years of Solidarity

Throughout the years, Local 495 has remarkably had only three Secretary-Treasurers. The first one was union veteran Frank Hatfield, Sr. His focus and enthusiasm helped the Local become one of the strongest and best-recognized locals in the West.

Hatfield was a true visionary who expanded the Local beyond worksites that had been automotive in nature — by organizing parking attendants at valet services, downtown lots and the California racetracks. Later, workers in repair shops, gas stations, rock and gravel sites and employees in the food, bakery and dairy industries became Local 495 members.

Karl Ullman, who had a reputation for cementing key contracts and who had served as a Business Agent and President, was named Secretary-Treasurer in 1970 when Frank Hatfield retired. Ullman served with tenacity and, like Hatfield, was responsible for critical contract language improvements

and bargaining new agreements with a solid foundation.

Ullman retired in 1992 and I was then named Secretary-Treasurer. Hatfield's son, Frank, Jr. perhaps said it best: "We transferred the leadership by evolution, rather than revolution."

This continuity in leadership has given us tremendous stability and leverage at the bargaining table. While employers respect our established experience and depth of knowledge, it's our members who have benefited from this constancy.

In the 80's the Local saw the demise of manufacturing jobs, the loss of positions due to technological advances, and we weathered a serious recession. Much of what is happening today reminds me of that era. And just like then, it has never been more important for you to have representation and solid contracts that will protect you, even as employers are attempting to negotiate reductions and takeaways.

Years ago, while other locals failed, Local 495 remained versatile and resilient. The membership stood tall and stood together. Like then, we will ride out this current economic storm as well. We must look forward and be optimistic. We have President Obama in the White House and a Democratic majority in Congress, and we hope that health care reform will become a reality. Working families finally have a voice in the halls of Congress. And even with this important political shift, we must keep our voices loud and unified. We in the labor movement must be as active as ever in holding our elected officials accountable for the promises they made and the decisions they make.

There is much to be optimistic about and even more to be grateful for. I hope you take the time to read through this special 70th commemorative edition of The Flash. I also hold the hope that you are as thankful as I am to be a member of Local 495.





























Waste Management


